Joe and Zan Tyler

Authors, Speakers and Homeschool Consultants



When Joe and Zan Tyler began homeschooling in 1984, the State Superintendent of Education threatened Zan with jail. For the next eight years, the Tylers battled for homeschool freedom and the establishment

of landmark homeschool legislation in South Carolina. In 1990, Joe and Zan founded the South Carolina Association of Independent Home Schools (SCAIHS), Joe as a founding board member and Zan as its president for ten years. Joe currently serves as the Chairman of the SCAIHS Board. Joe also serves on the Board for Excelsior Academy—a large homeschooling co-op that the Tylers founded. Joe and Zan enjoy speaking at homeschool conferences nationally and internationally. They have been married for forty years and spent twenty-one years homeschooling their three children from kindergarten through high school. All three children attended college.

Joe is the President of Followers in Fellowship, a 501c3 organization committed to preserving and advancing Christian education by supporting homeschool groups. He spent thirty years in the corporate world as an information systems project manager. Most recently Joe served as the Operations Director for Apologia.

As a popular author and speaker, Zan's passion is to encourage parents to raise children who love the Lord, understand their callings in life, and become active citizens who understand the principles of freedom that undergird our American heritage. She currently works with BJU Press Homeschool/HomeWorks by Precept. For sixteen years, Zan worked with Christian publishers to develop homeschool curriculum and resources. Zan is passionate, uplifting, and relatable.

Brian YoungCreation Instruction Association





Danna Swartz



The Stars: God's Word in the Sky Brian Young, Chapel

In almost every ancient culture the names of the stars were recorded, yet the Bible says "God calls each star by name." Do you suppose the names God calls them are the names that are preserved? When we closely examine them, it seems that they are. In asking the question of whether Israel had heard the message of Christ, it states in Romans "Faith comes from hearing the message, and the message is heard through the word of Christ. Did they not hear? Of course they did: 'Their voice has gone out into all the earth, their words to the ends of the world" (Rom 10:17-18). I used to think it must have been the prophets that gave the "Word of Christ" to Israel until I realized that this was a quote from Psalm 19 declaring that the "words" and "voice" was from the heavens. See how each constellation gives a clear message of Christ as well as His return. This is NOT astrology, but simply Christ's creation declaring His glory.

Vision & Learning Mikaela Betka, 1101-1102

20/20 vision means you can see clearly at 20 feet what should normally be seen at that distance. However, it does not mean that you have perfect vision. Visual acuity gives no meaning about what a person sees. If your child is not achieving their full potential academically, struggling with written reading comprehension, skips lines or words when reading, reverses words or letters, or avoids reading or near work, this presentation is for you. There are more than 17 visual skills that are needed for efficient vision and learning. Children struggling with binocular vision or visual processing disorders often will not complain about symptoms because they are unaware that they visually experience things any differently than their peers. In this course, we will learn about these skills, the signs and symptoms of a visual processing disorder, and what can be done to help them be successful.

Teaching Reading, Writing, and Pioneer History with Bess Streeter Aldrich Resources Kurk Shrader, 1404



as Joe's parents and my parents provided opportunities for Ty, John, and Lizzy to be involved in projects that I would not have had the time for or access to. On many occasions my mother took us to Charlotte to visit her mother in a nursing home. During the course of our visits, the children often spent meaningful time with other people in the facility as well. The boys delivered Thanksgiving meals to needy families with my dad for many, many years. Through Joe's parents, all three children had the opportunity to help with their church's very large day camp and to serve as counselors at a camp for the underprivileged. Lizzy worked with them for several years on Operation Christmas Child. This project, sponsored by Samaritan's Purse, focuses on helping children in war-torn or impoverished countries during the holidays.

For six years we were involved in tutoring in an inner-city outreach program sponsored by Joe's parents' church. This required about three hours once a week. Tutoring is a great avenue for service because it is so desperately needed in today's world with the rising number of functionally illiterate adults and children. As homeschooling parents, we already know how to tutor. We don't have to learn any new skills—just employ the ones we already have! We can also model for the families we're involved with the necessity of parental involvement in the lives and education of their children. Each of our three children began tutoring with me and then moved on to tutor individually, as they grew older and more confident.

Opportunities to serve others are endless; we just need to creatively look for them. Teens have a variety of options open to them, based on their interests and gifts. Once they are old enough to drive, they are free to become involved in ministries and organizations without your having to get them there or be there all the time. You still need to thoroughly check out the organizations your teens are involved in, to make sure they are reputable and your teens will be safe. I know teens that have been involved in the Special Olympics, Joni and Friends, Meals-on-Wheels, and prolife organizations—just to name a few options. Many churches and homeschool support groups also have formalized

She works with BJU Press Homeschool and HomeWorks by Precept. She worked in Christian publishing and curriculum development for 16 years. In 2015 she was presented with the Chris Klicka Award by HSLDA for her dedication and commitment to home education worldwide.
